From the Desk of Father John

(Continued from last bulletin: Ten reasons to go to Mass)

6.) People need our prayers. We can pray for other people anytime, but when we pray for others during Mass, we pray in a special way. It doesn't matter if the other people are separated from us by distance or by death. The Mass brings us together in the Body of Christ, and we become the communion of saints. It is part of the cosmic dimension of the Mass that unites heaven and earth by reaching across time and space.

7.) We need to stand up for what we believe. Being a follower of Jesus is counter-cultural. At every Mass, we have the opportunity to stand up and proclaim what we believe publicly. We admit that we believe in God, in Jesus, in the Holy Spirit, in the Catholic Church, in the communion of saints, in the forgiveness of sins, and in life after death. It is a powerful statement of allegiance and an opportunity to recommit ourselves.

8.) We need to acknowledge that we make mistakes. At every Mass, we have the opportunity to review the past week. We admit that we have sinned in thought, in word, in deed, in what we have done and what we have failed to do. We seek forgiveness, and we are assured that God still loves us. Before we receive Communion, we admit that we are not worthy and ask God to heal us. Going to Mass helps us to strengthen our commitment to live moral lives.

9.) We need ritual in our lives. Mass is a ritual, which means that through the repetition of prayers, movements, and the changing of bread and wine into the Body and Blood of Christ, we are formed, disciplined, and consoled. The "sameness" of the Mass carries us along the spiritual journey – even when we don't "feel" like praying. The "sameness" of the ritual allows us to be transformed on a soul level, even if we are unaware of what is happening.

10.) We need to experience something bigger than ourselves. When we go to Mass, we share in the death and resurrection of Jesus. When we offer our ordinary lives to God through Jesus, we enter into God's great plan for the world. We are strengthened by the Eucharist and sent out into the world to bring the gospel message to all people. The Mass gives meaning and purpose to our lives. It gives us a sense of destiny and offers the kind of peace that the world cannot give. It helps us develop a sense of wonder and awe. It helps us to see that there is something bigger than ourselves.

18th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Twenty years ago, Marianne Wilson saw a need; thousands of people with critical illnesses were going hungry in her area of Southern California, and she just wasn't going to stand for it. She began cooking healthy meals and delivering them to men, women and children dying from HIV/AIDS, cancer, and other diseases at no cost to the recipients. Today, the organization is known as Project Angel Food, and every year produces over 400,000 meals and delivers them to more than 1,600 people. On its Web site, it says, "We act out of a sense of urgency because hunger and illness do not wait."

It had been barely twenty-four hours since the miracle of the loaves and fishes; thousands had found nourishment. Jesus and His disciples had crossed the Sea of Galilee to Capernaum, and still many in the crowd from the day before found Him, wanting another miracle. But Jesus offered them and us a greater miracle; if we are only to believe in the Son of God, we will never hunger again. Our faith is our work; this work will be generously rewarded.

In the Lord's Prayer we pray "Give us this day our daily bread." Fully understanding today's Gospel reading from John enables us to comprehend the dual meaning of this petition: our bodies will hunger, please provide nourishment, and our souls hunger, please provide through our faith the bread of life that is faith in Jesus Christ. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches us that "the drama of hunger in the world calls Christians who pray sincerely to exercise responsibility toward their brethren, both in their personal behavior and in their solidarity with the human family" (CCC 2831).

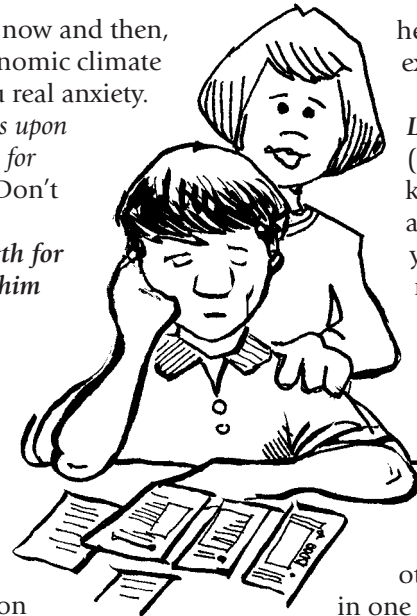
"Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life ..."

Everyone worries now and then, but the current economic climate may be causing you real anxiety.

"Cast all your worries upon him because he cares for you" (1 Peter 5:1). Don't lose faith or heart.

"I have the strength for everything through him who empowers me" (Philippians 4:13). Your troubles may seem overwhelming but God won't leave you to deal with them alone. Take prayerful action to resolve your situation and God will supply what you need to succeed.

"More precious than gold is health and well-being" (Sirach 30:15). Worry can erode your health so it is important that you take care of yourself. Eat



healthfully. Make time for exercise. Pray often. Rest.

"Give thanks to the Lord, who is good ..." (Psalms 106:1). Worry can keep you from appreciating the good in your life. Reserve ten minutes each day to give thanks to God for all you have.

"Give and gifts will be given to you" (Luke 6:38). One way to escape worry – even for a short time – is to help others. You may need help

in one area of your life, but have the ability to give help in another. Caring for others helps to take your mind off yourself and your troubles. Plus, Jesus promised, *"For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you."*

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Ordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are bishops, priests, and deacons. However, the bishop can appoint others to help as Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist for an occasion or a period of time.

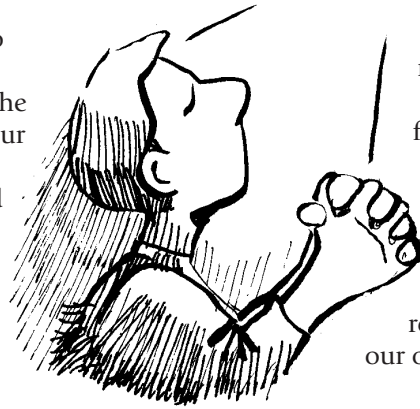
bishop to serve in his parish as Extraordinary Ministers when the congregation is so large that distributing Holy Communion during Mass would take too long or when there are too many sick and homebound for the Ordinary Ministers to visit without help.

Pray the all-purpose prayer

Like us, the disciples needed Jesus' help to grow in holiness. When they asked Jesus to teach them to pray, he gave them (and us) the perfect formula for prayer. In fact, in the "Our Father," he gave us four prayers in one.

First, it is a prayer of praise and gives God the glory that he is due. Recognizing God's greatness is the right place to start.

Second, it is a prayer of petition in which we ask God to provide what we need. He knows better than we do what



we need, but giving it voice helps us to recognize the answer when it comes.

Third, the "Our Father" asks for forgiveness. Plus, we ask for strength to be as generous in forgiving as we would like God to be toward us.

And last, it is a prayer of acknowledgement. It forces us to admit that God knows what is best for us and reminds us to submit to his will rather than our own. That's what makes it an essential prayer.

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23 Clean hearts vs. clean hands

The religious leaders sent investigators to check up on Jesus and didn't like what they saw. Not only were Jesus and his followers ignoring some traditional rituals, Jesus scolded the leaders for being hypocrites when they did observe them. They were outwardly obedient so they could look holy instead of taking steps to actually be holy.

For example, devout Jews performed a cleansing ritual before each meal. The Pharisees liked to believe this ceremony kept them from being considered unclean. They were critical because Jesus'



followers didn't perform this ceremony. Jesus told them that they were wrong to think being clean on the outside made them acceptable to God. God cares more about the state of our hearts than our hands.

Hypocrisy is when we pretend to be something we aren't and have no intention of becoming. Jesus called the Pharisees hypocrites because they went through the motions of worshiping God so they could appear holy in the eyes of the Jews. We become hypocrites when we follow religious practices carefully but allow our hearts to remain distant from God.

Q & A Why hasn't God answered my prayer?

God is always listening and he always answers prayer. He loves you more than you can imagine and only wants the best for you. He doesn't want you to be unhappy, sick, or worried. In fact, he knows what you need better than you do.

If it feels like he isn't listening or hasn't answered you, don't lose hope. God's answers usually fall into one of three responses: 1) Yes, 2) Not right now, and 3) I have a better idea. The best approach is to make your request, trust him to do the right thing, and then look for the answer.

Maybe he wants you to wait a while before he grants your request to increase your appreciation or because he doesn't think you are ready yet. Perhaps he has something better in mind. Whatever the answer – and there is always an answer – remember that it comes from his love.



Feasts & Celebrations

August 6 – Transfiguration of the Lord. Tradition says that Mt. Tabor was the site of the Transfiguration during which Christ showed his disciples the splendor of his beauty. The Lord appeared radiant in the company of Moses and Elijah, and a voice was heard to say, "This is my beloved son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him."

August 15 – Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Declared a dogma of our faith in 1950 by Pope Pius XII, the Assumption celebrates

Mary's taking up into Heaven body and soul at the end of her life.

August 27 – St. Monica (387). A Christian in North Africa, Monica was given in marriage to a pagan, Patricius, whose bad temper made life difficult for her. Monica's patience, piety, and prayers won over her husband who was baptized before he died. Monica is also credited for influencing the conversion of her son, Augustine, who became one of the great saints of the Church.



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
