From the Desk of Father John

Continuation of *10 Things That Make for a Great Catholic Mom*:

Cultivate support (Luke 1:39-45). One of the most important aspects of motherhood is seeking out support and encouragement from other mothers. The Catholic faith is communal; we believe that we are all connected in the one Body of Christ. It is essential to remember that we are not alone. Sharing the ups and downs of motherhood with women who are at the same stage of parenting or asking advice from moms who have older kids can help us through the day-to-day stresses and strains of raising kids. *Who are some women who support my vocation to motherhood? Is it time to connect with them again?*

Make every day holy (Psalm 118:4). Every new day gives us the opportunity to celebrate the divine presence of God in the smallest and most ordinary events. Gathering around the table and sharing a meal together as a family can be a sacred time of connection and love. The brief hug and kiss goodbye before school each day can be a blessed moment of sending forth. Tracing a cross on our children's foreheads before they head out the door for school or before they go to bed is a simple way to acknowledge the presence of God every day. The habit of bedtime prayers can help ensure a good night's sleep. Noticing the holy moments in everyday life helps kids develop a sense of wonder and reverence that will sustain their faith for years to come. *What "holy moments" have occurred today? How might I notice or create more sacred spaces each day?*

Grow in faith (1 Peter 2:2-5). Nourishing our own faith growth is one of the best ways for Catholic moms to model discipleship for our kids. From attending adult formation classes to volunteering as a catechist, from reading the Bible to participating in the parish book club, developing our own faith life as an adult teaches our kids that faith formation is a lifelong journey. One of the best ways to deepen our relationship with God is through prayer. Praying with Scripture (the Psalms are a great choice), traditional meditative prayers such as the rosary, or even free-form conversation with God – carving out personal quiet time each day to pray and reflect is a gift to the body, mind, and spirit. *What have I done to nourish my own faith life lately? What might I do in the future?*

4th Sunday of Easter. We can't approach the highly symbolic language of the Book of Revelation with logical thinking. If we try to do so, we will falter, and miss out on the richness of the images that are presented to us. In today's selection, John (not the writer of the fourth Gospel, but another John) sees a vast crowd. One of the elders tells him that these are the ones who have survived the time of trial. This makes eminent sense since Revelation was written at a time when the church was undergoing great persecution from both the Jewish leaders who were expelling the Jewish followers of Jesus from the synagogues, and from Roman officials who saw Christians as disruptive apostates since they did not acknowledge the Roman gods. The ones who have survived "have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb" (7:14).

Here is where logic fails. Every laundry detergent bottle and stain-fighting additive will tell you that you don't make something white by washing it in blood. But when we immerse ourselves in the symbolism, we understand what the writer intends. Through the shedding of His blood on the cross, the Lamb of God (Jesus) cleanses us from sin. Like the white garment given at baptism to symbolize new life, those who have remained faithful during trial and persecution share in the victory of the One who conquered sin and death. The message for us today is that Christ has brought us into the fold, and that we are called to be faithful no matter what may beset us in life. It is unlikely that any of us will face overt persecution for what we believe. But we must also guard against the subtle denials of Christ that sometimes creep into our daily lives. *2010 Liturgical Publications Inc
