It's easy to identify a Catholic on Ash Wednesday: our signature cross of ashes gives us away. But after Ash Wednesday, and during the forty days that follow, how do we understand and make known what it means to be Catholic? What is the significance of the "penitential period" the Church has designated as Lent in the liturgical year, and how do we participate in Christ's sacrifice so as to fully experience His resurrection on Easter?

During the season of Lent, beginning on Ash Wednesday and continuing until Holy Thursday, the Church asks us to spend more time in intentional prayer, to fast and abstain from meat on designated days, and to practice charitable giving for the sake of others. Recalling Jesus' forty-day fast in the wilderness, we believe that our consistent participation in these practices is a form of purification that deepens our spiritual center by stripping away all that is unnecessary and by reminding us of our sole reliance on God.

The Church emphasizes such acts of self-denial and fraternal sharing not merely for adherence to formalities or outward displays of piety, but to echo Jesus' call for conversion. Without conversion of heart, penances remain sterile and false; however, interior conversion urges expression in visible signs, gestures and works. In one of his famous homilies, St. Peter Chrysologus stressed the unity of the three spiritual practices of Lent:

There are three things, my brethren, by which faith stands firm, devotion remains constant, and virtue endures. They are prayer, fasting and mercy. Prayer knocks at the door, fasting obtains, mercy receives. Prayer, mercy and fasting: these three are one, and they give life to each other.

Seen through the lens of Tradition, and founded in sacred Scripture, our Lenten journey of sacrifice works toward a purpose. Striving to understand its challenge and promise, we take up our crosses, just as we are signed with the cross at Lent's beginning, and walk the penitential road with Jesus.

March 15: *New Words, Deeper Meanings: Part 2*

We continue our study of the new Mass translations by looking at priest's parts.

– Fr. Tommy's Corner –

"The Lord be with you...and with your spirit."

The first noticeable change in the translation of the Mass will be the response to the priest's greeting to the people: *"The Lord be with you."* This change may be one of the simplest, but it could become one of the most difficult ones for the congregation to alter, since it has almost become automatic and habitual to respond: *"And also with you."* The new response that will replace *"And also with you"* will now be ***"And with your spirit."*** There are three reasons for the change:

- 1) *"And with your spirit"* is a more exact translation of the Latin original *"et cum spiritu tuo."*
- 2) The greeting *"And with your spirit"* more closely corresponds with the scriptural language used by St. Paul, such as in Philippians 4:23 *"The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit"* or in 2 Timothy 4:22 *"The Lord be with your spirit. Grace be with all of you."*
- 3) Finally, in our Catholic liturgical tradition, the greeting *"and with your spirit"* has evolved to be addressed to only those who have received the sacrament of Holy Orders, i.e. deacons, priests, or bishops. The reservation of this greeting for the ordained is meant to highlight the theological fact that when a man receives the sacrament of Holy Orders, his soul becomes permanently changed in conformance to Jesus, the Great High Priest. The one who is ordained is set apart for the great purpose of acting in the person of Christ, the High Priest. And therefore, when the bishop or priest performs the sacred rites, especially in offering the sacrifice of the Mass, it is actually Jesus who offers the Mass in the person of the bishop or priest who acts "in persona Christi". For this reason, the "spirit" that is referred to in the greeting, *"And with your spirit,"* is an acknowledgment of the unique presence of Christ the High Priest in the soul or "spirit" of the ordained ministers of the Church who perform the sacred rituals in the person of Christ.

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FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

Clerow Wilson, Jr. is a Golden Globe and two-time Emmy Award winning actor. He is also unknown to most Americans by that given name. As a comedian he was known as "Flip" Wilson. He was the first African-American to host his own weekly variety show on television and was considered by Time magazine to be television's first black superstar. When Wilson would perform as Geraldine Jones in one of his stage personas, audience members could bet that a final excuse-making phrase would be, "The devil made me do it!" In the character of Geraldine, Flip Wilson played off of the human predilection to give in to temptation.

With a history of over two thousand years of Christianity, the followers of Jesus today don't have many stumbling blocks to believing in Him as God. Most Christians simply grow up with that understanding. It becomes a part of our common view of who Jesus is. In our day, it may be more difficult to thoroughly comprehend the other aspect of Jesus' nature: that He was fully and completely human, or as Eucharistic Prayer 4 states it, "He shared our human nature in all things but sin." If that is truly the case (and as Catholics, we believe that it is), then Jesus was subject to all of the temptations and opportunities for sin that we ourselves experience.

Sunday's Gospel about the temptations of Jesus often gets analyzed through an approach that looks for symbolic meaning in the three encounters between Jesus and the devil. That can be one way of examining at the story. But as we begin Lent, it might be good to take a more general view that simply presents Jesus as a man struggling against temptation. That is what we do each and every day. In that, He was just like us. He overcame temptation by understanding God's will for Him. That sounds like a pretty good plan for our Lent as well.

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Dear Lord, we are now in the holy season of Lent. We begin to realize anew that these are the days of salvation, these are the acceptable days. We know that we are all sinners. We know that in many things we have all offended Your infinite majesty. We know that sin destroys Your life in us as a drought withers the leaves & chokes the life from the land, leaving an arid, dusty desert. Help us now, Lord, in our feeble attempts to make up for past sin. Bless our efforts with the rich blessing of Your grace. Make us realize ever more our need of penance & of mortification. Help us to see, in our ordinary difficulties & duties, in the trials & temptations of every day, the best opportunity of making up for past infidelities. Every day we are so often reminded in field & wood, in sky & stream, of Your own boundless generosity to us. Help us to realize that You are never outdone in generosity, & that the least thing we do for You will be rewarded, full measure, pressed down, shaken together, & flowing over. Then we shall see, in our own souls, how the desert can blossom, & the dry & wasted land can bring forth the rich, useful fruit that was expected of it from the beginning. Amen.
