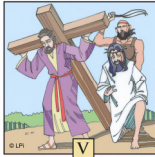

It is Lent, a time of reconciliation. This is a perfect time to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation or confession.

Confession is the term commonly used for the sacrament, but the confession of one's sins to a priest is only one part of Reconciliation. The others are *contrition and penance*.

Contrition. The process begins with a careful examination of conscience; contrition is perfect when it is motivated by the love of God and imperfect if it rests on other motives. We must admit that we've done wrong, and that we're responsible for it. The willingness to be honest about what we have done is the most important part of reconciliation. It's easy to come up with a dozen ways to excuse our behavior, or at least take the sting out of it. Human beings are masters of rationalization and self-justification. But being reconciled begins with pondering what we have done in the light of Christ's two commandments of love, the Sermon on the Mount, and the Ten Commandments as a basis against which we can measure ourselves.

Confession. The second part of Reconciliation is confession itself. The Church requires that we confess our sins to a priest. Why? Only God can forgive sins, after all. But the urge to confess our sins springs from a deep desire. As Pope John Paul II wrote, "The forgiven penitent is reconciled with himself in his inmost being." Let's turn the question around, then: Why *not* confess to a priest? The priest is bound to the strictest confidence. He cannot and will not say anything to anybody about what he hears in confession. And, because the priest absolves us "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit," our forgiveness actually does come from God, through the channel of a human being acting in God's name. Reasons for avoiding confession usually boil down to a desire to avoid embarrassment and awkwardness. Do you feel ashamed about what you've done? That's fitting, but don't let embarrassment become an excuse to avoid love and forgiveness. Being willing to tell another person about your faults takes courage. Confessing our sins means that we must *name* them, not merely admit to certain shortcomings." We take responsibility for concrete acts, which in itself is an act of humility. This counters pride – the deadliest of the seven deadly sins. It's important to realize that the Sacrament of Reconciliation is a ritual – like the Mass, like baptism, like all the other sacraments. There's an order to it. You say the words to confess your sins. The priest says words of absolution. It's not necessary to "feel" a certain way to know you are forgiven; though Our Lord knows we will sin again, if we have sincere contrition and desire to avoid further sin, the graces of the sacrament are always there.

Penance. The final part of the sacrament is the penance. Usually the priest will ask you to say some prayers or perform a simple act of charity. Like confession, penance is a concrete action. You *name* your sins; you *do* something to express your resolve to make amends. If we've harmed someone, we need to repair the damage as much as possible. This business of being forgiven and reconciled takes place in our everyday life. It's not happening in a "spiritual" realm divorced from the real world. The penance the priest gives reminds us that we need to live differently, to take steps to avoid sin in the future.

– Fr. Tommy's Corner –

The Gloria – Glory to God

The hymn of the Gloria is a song of praise to God in celebration of what God has done for us. It is properly sung at the beginning of Mass to indicate our joy and gratitude for what God has done namely by redeeming us in his Son and for what God is about to do by renewing this redemption through the holy sacrifice of the Mass. The Gloria is sung on all Sundays, except Sundays of Advent and Lent, and on all feast days that are classified as solemnities or feasts. You will find that the newly translated Gloria will be a little longer, because phrases that were left out of the first translation will now be properly restored to their rightful place. The opening line of the newly translated Gloria will be more faithful to what the angels actually sang when they delivered the good news of the birth of the Savior to the shepherds from the gospel of St. Luke: Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. And if you think about it, it makes more sense: not all people on earth have peace; instead only those who are of "good will" are given and receive the peace from God. Following the angelic hymn, there is a series of five statements, seemingly all saying the same thing, except with different words: We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory. This series of statements in effect declare the obvious fact that God is so worthy of our praise, and yet we are utterly speechless when we come before God's perfect presence, that all we can do is ramble on about how awesome God is!

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

In the nineteenth century, the Greek Orthodox began building a new church over the site of Jacob's well in Nablus, Palestine. The First World War interrupted the construction, and it was not until the end of the twentieth century that building resumed. The impetus for finishing the new church was spurred on by the martyrdom of the monk Philomenos in 1979 by Jewish extremists who broke into the monastic compound and hacked him to death as he was preparing for vespers. The new church was completed in 2007 and the remains of St. Philomenos were transferred there upon his glorification in 2008. Jacob's well is in the crypt of the church, the site of the monk's martyrdom, which occurred as he got ready to glorify God.

In the Gospel today Jesus points out to the Samaritan woman that the worship of God will take place neither at the Samaritan high place on the mountain that can be seen from Jacob's well (Mt. Gerizim) nor on the mountain of the Jewish Temple in Jerusalem (Mt. Zion). Jesus indicates that the worship of God will take place "in Spirit and truth" (John 4:23). The place of worship is no longer tied to a physical location.



Rather, the worship of God takes place within the human heart that is attentive to God's word.

While the monk Philomenos died defending a physical location, he would be among the first to acknowledge that Christianity is less about place and more about spirit. While buildings or shrines can inspire us, they do not constitute our faith, which resides in the person of Jesus Christ. The men and women who are preparing for baptism at the Easter vigil are committing themselves to following Christ, just as we who are already baptized profess to do. As the Samaritans told the woman in the Gospel, "we have heard for ourselves, and we know that this is truly the savior of the world" (Jn 4:42).

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The Family is the Church

Jesus Himself – even though He came from God and was God – needed the love and security that only a family can offer. The Church is the family of God and each other of our families contributes to making up that larger body of believers. Without families, there is no Church. In fact, in the early days of the Church, it was in the homes of the disciples and other early believers that the first celebrations of the Word and the Eucharist took place. These early families of believers are the solid rock foundations upon which the rest of us stand today.

In our present world where many people and things seek to draw us away from God and our faith, it is our families that can stand in the center of the storm, like lighthouses calling people home. This is why the Second Vatican Council referred to families as *ecclesia domestica*, “the domestic church.” It is in families where children receive their initial instructions in the Catholic faith, where they are encouraged to pursue the vocations of their choice, and especially where those called to religious vocations can be nurtured and fostered. It is in the family that all members learn to become members of the larger Church.

In addition to being the domestic church and the teachers of faith, the family is also the original cell of social life. In the family we learn morals, virtues, manners, and other things that we need to be contributing members of human society. In families we learn to care for each other and for those around us.

Finally, through our families we are called to prayer. It is where we learn to pray as children, and, as teenagers and adults, it is a place where we can go to have our faith and our spiritual strength renewed.
