From the Desk of Msgr.John

Habemus Papam – We have a new Pope! On Wednesday, March 13, 2013, Argentinian Jorge Cardinal Bergoglio became Pope Francis, our 266th Pope. We pray for his intentions and for him as he guides the Catholic Church in our world at this time.

Today we celebrate the Fifth Sunday of Lent. "Let the one among you who is without sin, be the first to throw a stone." The season of Lent calls us to recognize our own sinfulness. This familiar passage from the Gospel of John urges us to look at our sins before we condemn another. Jesus silences the scribes and Pharisees by fulfilling the Law of Moses without condemning the woman. Jesus grants forgiveness to the woman (and to us), and this authority comes from God.

God offers eternal forgiveness. Sin separates us from God. The only sins that remain unforgiven are the ones we haven't repented. Examine your conscience this Lent.

The scribes and Pharisees in this passage seem not to care about the woman and care more about putting Jesus in a difficult situation in an attempt to entrap Him. Jesus, in contrast, treats the woman with dignity. Our faith demands that we treat people with dignity and respect.

In today's Gospel, Jesus says to the woman, "Go and sin no more." How might we break the patterns of sin in our lives?

Please pray for the blessing of rain:

Almighty God, we are in need of rain. We realize now, looking up into the clear, blue sky, what a marvel even the least drop of rain really is. To think that so much water can fall out of the sky, which now is empty and clear! We place our trust in You. We are sure that You know our needs. But You want us to ask You anyway, to show You that we know we are dependent on You. Look on our dry hills and fields, dear God, and bless them with the living blessing of soft rain. Then the land will rejoice, and the rivers will sing Your praises, and the hearts of men will be made glad. Amen.

5th Sunday of Lent — The woman in the Gospel is unexpectedly brought before Jesus today. She is exposed in front of everyone. Here she is, being confronted with shame, and sin, and all the condemnation that the indignant elders could heap upon her. Jesus points out to her accusers their own shortcomings, and in light of that, they all fade away. She is left before Him alone, and He admonishes her to avoid sin in the future.

While alcoholism is understood to be a disease and not so much a moral failing, there is human suffering that can be fallout from such an affliction. That's why one of the Twelve Steps in Alcoholics Anonymous is to be willing to make amends to all persons that have been harmed. Making amends is also part of the sacrament of penance. When confessing our sins, there is the expectation that we will have to make some sort of restitution. That's what real penance is: an amendment, that is, a correction of one's life. We've spent part of Lent examining our lives and assessing where we have failed in living according to God's will. Like Kate in the movie, maybe we've had a sudden moment of insight. Or maybe we've just come to the realization of what we need to correct. Now is the time for us to confess, to do penance, and to be reconciled to God and neighbor. (2013 Liturgical Publications, Inc.)
