Entrusted with the Mystery of Faith

The prophet Isaiah speaks of Eliakim, son of Hilkiah. The Lord entrusts to him the key of the house of David. Symbolically, this action represents entrusting Eliakim with access to the governance of God’s people and to the hope of his enduring covenant with them.

In an even more dramatic gesture, Jesus entrusts Peter with “the keys of the kingdom of heaven.” With those keys, Jesus entrusts to Peter and to the Church he will lead, the power to loose and bind on earth. In other words, the healing, forgiving, and restoring power and authority of Jesus remains alive and active in his Church after his Ascension and before his return in glory at the end of time. It has a center

and a focus in Peter and his successors as well as in the other Apostles and their successors.

The great mystery of faith is Jesus Christ and his death and Resurrection as well as our new life in God that this mystery opens for us.

Truly, the mystery surpasses our understanding and expectations, as Saint Paul says in today’s selection from his letter to the Romans.

Even more remarkably, God has made the mystery accessible to us. By empowering Peter and those who succeed him and the other Apostles to have clear authority to speak in Jesus’ name, God enables us—all of us across space and time—to have sure and stable contact with Jesus’ saving mysteries.



The Faith of the Church

The Lord Jesus wanted his people to stay true to the teaching he had given them. So he called apostles to collaborate with him and to guide his holy people. The bishops are the successors to the apostles; they are shepherds of God’s people. Peter and his successors, the popes, serve to maintain the unity and fidelity of the bishops who are for God’s people (Cf. Vatican II’s *Dogmatic Constitution on the Church*, n. 18).



Questions of the Week

Our faith is a living reality. We believe in Jesus Christ and try to follow him as his faithful disciples. We do so in many different circumstances and situations. However we always stand in need of guidance and direction to stay faithful.

Adults

In today’s complex world of challenges, how do I maintain an authoritative voice to help move authentically and consistently forward in faith?

Children

How do my parents, my teachers, and the members of my parish community help me to know my faith and grow in it?

Responding to God's Word . . .

Obviously, one of the hallmarks of being Catholic is to be in communion with the Pope who is the bishop of Rome. We find the biblical foundation for our Catholic faith concerning the Pope in today's Gospel. Jesus entrusted Peter with a special ministry in the Church. Peter died for the faith, but his ministry continues through his successors, the Popes.

It would be a mistake to think of the Pope as the "king of the Church." The word "Pope" comes from a word for "father"; and the title that Pope Saint Gregory claimed of "servant of the servants of God" describes his position in the Church.

The Pope is both a father and a servant.

The responsibility given to Peter is three-fold. The Lord wants him to have authority that enables him to help keep the Church faithful to the true teaching of Jesus Christ. In other parts of the Bible, Peter plays an important role in fostering the unity of the Church. Finally, at the Last Supper Jesus said to him, "Confirm your brothers." In other words, be a source of encouragement for the whole Church.

The responsibility Peter and his successors received is a gift we gratefully receive in the Church.

SUGGESTIONS

Use one of these suggestions or one of your own to respond to God's Word this week.

In the home. Make it a point to have a picture of the Holy Father in your home and to offer a prayer for him occasionally, perhaps at mealtime.

In the workplace or in school. Affirm the faith and religious traditions of others as Peter was called to do.

In the community. Do something that would build a bridge between different kinds of people and so walk in the footsteps of Peter who worked for unity.
