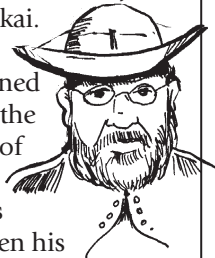

Fr. Damien of Molokai

The Year of Faith saint for May is Fr. Damien of Molokai.

Born in Belgium in 1840, he joined his brother in the Congregation of the Sacred Hearts of Jesus and Mary. When his brother couldn't serve the lepers on the Island of Molokai (those with Hansen's disease), Fr. Damien went instead. Horrified by the conditions, Fr. Damien built schools, churches, hospitals and sanitation facilities. He bestowed dignity and hope and served until his death from the disease in 1889.

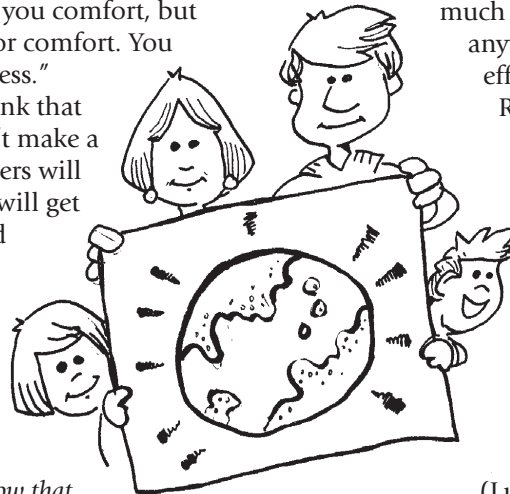
Commit. Find a parish ministry or charity you love and adopt it. Your contribution will benefit the future.

Empower others. Be generous with praise and stingy with criticism. Offering sincere praise and encouragement helps others achieve goals and adds value to the world.



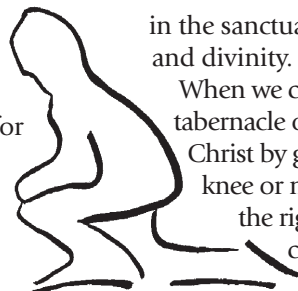
Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do we genuflect in church?

Most Catholic Churches have a tabernacle in the sanctuary. The tabernacle contains consecrated hosts for people in the hospital or nursing homes, and those in danger of death. Therefore, Jesus is present

in the sanctuary: body and blood, soul and divinity.

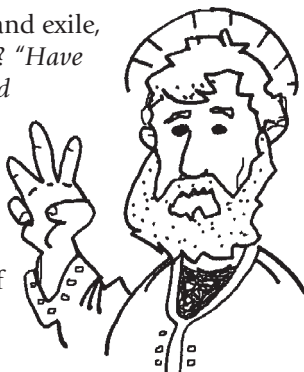
When we cross in front of the tabernacle or enter a pew, we honor Christ by genuflecting on the right knee or making a deep bow. We use the right knee because that is considered the side of honor.



A 3-step cure for stress

St. Paul knew stress. He spent time in prison and exile, experienced frustration and conflict. His advice? *“Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus”* (Philippians 4:4-7).

“Have no anxiety at all.” Step 1 – Rid yourself of worry. There is a difference between concern, which leads us to take steps to be prepared, and



worry, which produces nothing but stress.

“Make your requests known to God.” Step 2 – Carry everything to God in prayer. St. Paul added the phrase, “with thanksgiving,” to remind us to put our trust completely in the Lord to provide for us.

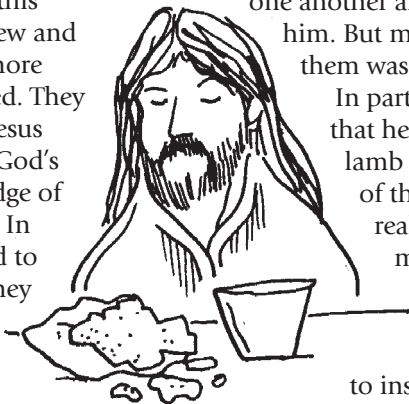
“The peace of God ... will guard your hearts and minds.” Step 3 – Keep your mind on God and experience his peace. The perfect peace that only God can give will come to those who keep their minds and hearts focused on Jesus.

from Scripture

John 16:12-15, the coming of the Holy Spirit

This reading is from St. John’s account of the Last Supper. By this point, the Apostles knew and accepted that God is more than they had imagined. They also understood that Jesus had a special place in God’s plan but their knowledge of his role was imperfect. In this reading, Jesus tried to explain to them that they would understand in time.

By the time the Last Supper took place, the Apostles had spent three years with Jesus, traveling, listening, speaking, and learning from him. Some of what Jesus



taught was quite clear – love God, love one another and tell others about him. But much of what Jesus told them was hard to understand.

In particular, Jesus told them that he would be the sacrificial lamb who takes away the sins of the world. The Apostles really struggled what this meant. But Jesus let them know the “Spirit of truth” (the Holy Spirit) would come to instruct them and to make everything clear.

The same is true for us. When we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit, much becomes clear.

Q & A What are the precepts of the Church?

The five precepts of the Church are designed to bring us closer to God through the Mass and penance.

We’re to attend Mass on Sundays. As members of the Body of Christ, we’re strengthened when we worship together.

We’re to confess our sins at least once a year. We all commit sin, often on a daily basis. Yet we see a lack of the sense of sin in our society. Confession brings us to recognize our sinfulness and return us to a state of grace.

We’re to receive Holy Communion at least during the Easter season. There are those who think they’re never worthy to receive the Eucharist and who never would without this precept.

We’re to keep the Holy Days of Obligation. These feasts honoring the Lord, the Blessed Virgin, and the saints who teach us more about our faith.

We’re to observe the prescribed days of fasting and abstinence. These acts of penance take us out of our comfort zone so we can focus on our relationship with Christ.

Feasts & Celebrations

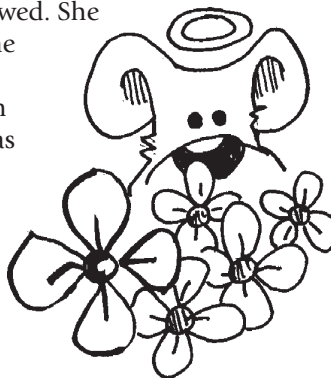
In May we honor Mary as Queen of Heaven and Earth. On May 31st, we commemorate the Visitation when Mary visited her cousin Elizabeth to share her joy at being favored by God.

May 1 – St. Joseph the Worker. Entrusted with the care of the Blessed Mother and Jesus, Joseph was a carpenter dedicated to his family and obedient to God.

May 20 – St. Bernardine of Siena (1444). As Franciscan, his boundless energy and joy was put to use running the local hospital during the great plague in Europe. Then, after a dozen

years in solitude, he journeyed across Italy preaching. The symbol of the sun with IHS, the first three letters of Jesus’ name in Greek, is attributed to him.

May 22 – St. Rita of Cascia (1457). Unwillingly married off to a cruel husband at the age of twelve, St. Rita spent eighteen unhappy years before being widowed. She then became an Augustinian nun and was known for her devotion to prayer and charity.

Eucharistic Procession

in honor of the

Solemnity of the

Body & Blood of Christ

What is a Eucharistic Procession? A Eucharistic Procession is a liturgical procession of the Church by which we take our Lord's Body and Blood truly present in the Blessed Sacrament and place it in a monstrance (a special gold holder that displays the Blessed Sacrament) and carry it about, usually into the streets of the city, as a sign of our faith in the Eucharist. In the tradition of the Church, a Eucharistic Procession is recommended by the Church's liturgical law for the feast days of the Body and Blood of Christ or *Corpus Christi* (which is after the Easter Season – this year being June 2, 2013) and of Christ the King (which is the last Sunday of Ordinary Time before Advent begins). Another form of the Eucharistic Procession is required at the Holy Thursday Evening Mass of the Lord's Supper to transfer the Blessed Sacrament out of the church as a symbol of Christ leaving the room of the Last Supper to pray in the Garden of Gethsemane with the Apostles.

What is the significance of a Eucharistic Procession or even any liturgical procession? By its very nature, a procession requires movement from one place to another place. In a liturgical procession, as in the Eucharistic Procession, the movement by the people from one place to another place is meant to symbolize our entire lives and our destiny, which is to be a movement towards eternal union with God. Therefore, the procession is an image of our pilgrimage to God.

What will we do in a Eucharistic Procession? In a procession, as in life, everyone has their particular roles to play. The priest, being the representative of Jesus, will carry the Blessed Sacrament. A special canopy is held above the Blessed Sacrament during the procession. This canopy is symbolic of the Holy Spirit who hovered above Christ at His Baptism in the Jordan. And it also symbolizes that the True Presence of Christ is travelling with us. In the Old Testament, a cloud would settle above the Ark of the Covenant to indicate that God was dwelling with His people. The canopy is like the cloud. Altar servers will lead the procession with the customary processional cross and candles. Two altar servers with burning censers will incense the Blessed Sacrament all throughout the procession as a sign of our worship. Six altar servers will accompany the Blessed Sacrament with lighted torches as in the parable where the wise virgins accompanied the bridegroom to the wedding feast. Two servers will ring bells as during the consecration to draw attention to the Eucharist. First communicants from the parish will be the special escorts of our Lord. Sodalties such as the Knights of Columbus, the Catholic Daughters, and the Christian Mothers will be represented in the procession. And all

others will join in singing the praises of our Eucharistic Lord during the procession led by a choir. At the conclusion of the procession, the Rite of Eucharistic Benediction will be celebrated back in the church.

What is the Rite of Eucharistic Benediction or simply Benediction? The word “benediction” simply means blessing. In the Rite of Eucharistic Benediction the priest blesses all the people with the Blessed Sacrament. He wears a humeral veil over his shoulders to cover his hands as a sign that this blessing does not come from him, but comes directly from the Lord who is present in the Eucharist.

When is the Eucharistic Procession? The Eucharistic Procession for our parish will be on Sunday evening, June 2, 2013, beginning in the church at Sacred Heart at 6:00 PM. We will begin with the Rite of Exposition, celebrate a short Liturgy of the Word, and then begin the procession to the courthouse square and back to the church for Benediction.

Who should attend? All Catholics who wish to witness to our Eucharistic faith should plan to participate in this procession! That means ALL CATHOLICS: young and old! Invite friends and family members to join us even if they are not necessary parishioners of our churches. Remember to make this a family event. What better way could you spend a Sunday afternoon, which is the Lord’s day, than for your family to pray together and then “take a walk” with the Lord in this Eucharistic Procession? Recall that Sundays still belong to the Lord and we need to witness to that fact.

What if I can’t walk that far? For those who are not capable of walking to the courthouse square, they may remain in the church and pray a communal rosary which will be led by a leader. Then when the procession returns, the Rite of Benediction will be celebrated.

What do I receive for participating in the Eucharistic Procession? In order to promote the devotion of Eucharistic Processions, the Church grants a plenary indulgence to the faithful who “devoutly participate in a solemn Eucharistic procession, held inside or outside a church, of greatest importance on the Solemnity of the Body and Blood of Christ” (*Manual of Indulgences*, no. 7.3 under Grants). The usual conditions must be met to gain the plenary indulgence, in addition to performing the indulgenced work (this case being participating in the Eucharistic Procession) and to be free from the attachment to sin, even venial sin: 1) to receive the sacrament of confession; 2) to receive Holy Communion; and 3) to pray for the intentions of our Holy Father, the Pope. Confession can be received either several days (usually about 7 days) before or after the procession. Communion should be received at Mass on the Solemnity. And prayer for the Holy Father should be offered that day. If the conditions are not met, then the indulgence is only partial.

What about after the Eucharistic Procession? A fellowship supper will be provided for all who participate in the Eucharistic Procession in the Family Center. This is a time for our parish family to gather together to extend the celebration of our Eucharistic faith from the church into our “regular” lives. Please plan to stay to enjoy each other’s company!

Let us witness firmly to our Catholic faith and

show our love for our Lord who gave us His Body and Blood to be our food and drink,

by participating in the Eucharistic Procession on June 2!
