In Hebron, David is hailed as king by all the tribes of Israel. Jesus is anointed king on the wood of his cross, a sign of paradox, of defeat yet final victory. Through his cross we have passed from darkness into the kingdom of light.

First Sunday of Advent

Readings: Isaiah 2:1-5 Psalm 122:1-9 Romans 13:11-14 Matthew 24:37-44

Let us rejoice in the Lord's peace; let us live honorably as we await his return.

Second Sunday of Advent

Readings: Isaiah 11:1-10 Psalm 72:1-2,7-8,12-13,17 Romans 15:4-9 Matthew 3:1-12

Reform your lives: live in God's peace so that justice may flourish.

The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Pastoral Feast Day of the United States of America (not a holy day of obligation this year)

Readings: Genesis 3:9-15,20 Psalm 98:1-4 Ephesians 1:3-6,11-12 Luke 1:26-38

Chosen by God, Mary reverses the sin of Eve. Because of her obedience, God's salvation is made known to all the nations. Originating in the 7th century, feast of the "Conception of Mary by St. Anne," Pope Clement XI, in his Bull, *Commissi Nobis*, established this Solemnity for the entire Church in 1708; patroness of the United States of America, Spain, Tanzania, and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

FROM DESK OF MSGR. JOHN

Today, Sunday, we have the Christ the King procession. We will begin at 2:00 p.m. in Sacred Heart Church and process around the Hallettsville Courthouse Square and back to the church. We hope to have the various organizations to process with their banners. If the weather is bad, we will have the service in the church from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m. Let us turn out to honor Christ our King.

Americans celebrate Thanksgiving Day this Thursday. This week will be one of the busiest for travel. Local news channels will broadcast stories about Thanksgiving meals and also about the poor who will be served by others. The president will pardon a turkey. Stores will gear up for Black Friday sales and a big shopping weekend. Financial markets in the U.S. will be closed down Thursday and have shortened hours on Friday. The collision of sentiments of gratitude and crass commercialism on a single weekend can make for certain incongruence in one's experience of these few days.

As we celebrate the feast of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, we are presented with a seemingly huge incongruity in the Gospel that is proclaimed this year. We celebrate a great King, and in our human experience when we hear of a king we think of fine robes, sumptuous feasts, grand castles, and scores of courtiers and servants. The Gospel today gives us a broken man, abandoned by His friends, condemned, reviled by a criminal, and hanging on a cross. This is the King we honor today.

Thank God that we can live with a certain amount of discord in our lives. It is what allows us to hold in balance seemingly contradictory notions, like the fact that a crucified man is our Lord and King. One of the criminals crucified with Jesus asks that he be remembered when Jesus comes into His kingdom. That plea, uttered near the moment of his death, has become a prayer for Christians through the centuries, because we believe that the death of Jesus was not the end. We believe that His death was just the beginning, ushering in a new kingdom, and promising a new life that can be ours if we submit ourselves to the rule of this universal King. The promise Christ makes to the repentant thief is the promise He makes to us: we will be with Him in paradise.

A fruitful Advent makes for a wonderful Christmas

It is said that a good beginning leads to a good outcome. Then a true Advent observance is a great step toward a wonderful Christmas. And a good Advent can also bring you spiritual renewal along the way.

Waiting can often produce greater joy when the wait is finally over. Why not consider adopting one or two of these ideas to increase your Christmas joy through a fruitful Advent wait?

Pray the Wait.

- **Commit random acts of prayer.** Pray while you wait in line. Pray in the car. Pray when you're put on hold. Pray on your way to work. Keep your prayer simple and heartfelt.
- **Wait in his presence.** Make a visit to the tabernacle in your church to the Body of Christ. Spending time in reverent prayer before the Eucharist will bring healing and peace.
- **Ask God's advice for how much to spend on Christmas gifts.** It is hard to fully prepare for the Savior when you are racking up debt. Celebrate joyfully, simply, and responsibly.
- **Make a joyful noise.** St. Augustine is credited with saying that singing is praying twice. Hum along with the carols in the elevator. Sing hymns joyfully at Mass. Listen to Handel's Messiah or other sacred music of the season. Use song to boost your prayer - even if it's just singing in the shower.
- **Before you speak or act, pray that you will bear God's image in all that you say or do.** In this way, we won't be strangers, but rather will be ready and waiting to welcome him.
- **"Hail Mary" your way through Advent.** Consider the Blessed Mother's example of faith. Learn to see through her eyes, listen with her ears, and trust with her heart.



Anticipate with hope.

- **This is a good time to make peace with one another, and be forgiving.** Jesus said, "Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift" (Matthew 25:23-25).
- **Open your heart.** December is the loneliest month of the year. Make a list of people you know who live alone, are new to your area, or who have lost a loved one this year. Include them in your family events, invite them to Mass, or pay them a visit.
- **Champion a service project.** Many parishes gather gifts for disadvantaged families or folks forgotten in nursing homes. Find out what your local community is doing or begin your own service traditions.
- **Become a soldier in the war for peace.** Avoid quarreling or gossip, and work for a spirit of unity.
- **Convert your heart.** Do a thorough examination of your conscience so that you can recognize patterns of sin that need to be changed. If you need help spotting them, ask your priest for advice when you go to Confession. (Hint: if you think you don't have any sins, read Exodus 20 and Matthew 5.)
- **Mark the season.** You may not be able to wait until Christmas Eve to decorate your home, but why not decorate slowly throughout Advent to measure progress through the season?
- **Advertise your faith in Jesus' birth.** Put on a joyful appearance, no matter what is going on in your day. Remind yourself of the coming miracle and what it means for each of us.

However you choose to observe Advent, remember the gifts of the first Christmas -- justice, peace, and freedom. They are God's Christmas gifts to us all.

She sent him to ask the bishop to build a chapel for her, and had Juan bring roses as a sign. When the roses spilled from his tilma (cape) before the bishop, it retained the image of the Blessed Mother which can be seen today. Millions converted as a result.

Unwrap the gift. The Bible is the great

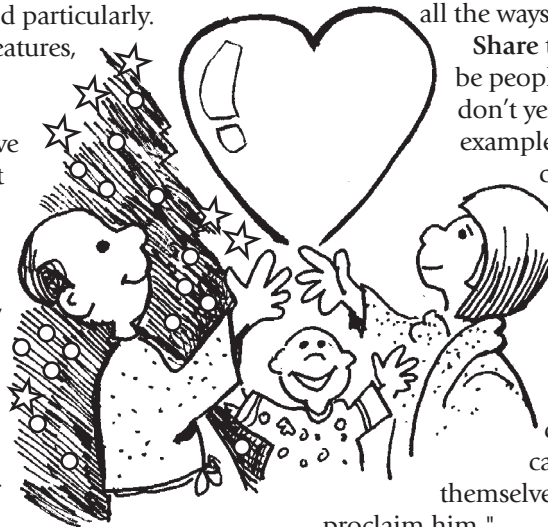
story of God's love and a personal love letter written by God to each of us.

proclaim him."

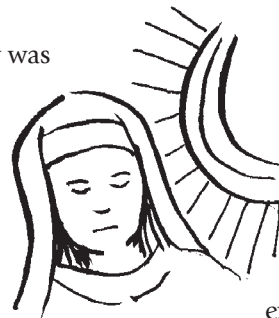

Why Do Catholics Do That?

Why do we celebrate the Immaculate Conception?

In December, we commemorate that Mary was conceived in St. Anne's womb without Original Sin. (Normally a Holy Day of Obligation, this year the solemnity is on December 9th and Mass attendance is not obligatory.)

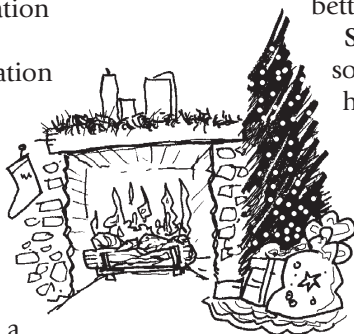


In 1854, Pope Pius IX pronounced that by a special act of divine grace, the Blessed Mother was conceived, through the union of her natural father and mother, without the stain of Original Sin, which has afflicted all other humans except for her divine Son.

Do you wish for an idyllic Christmas celebration complete with a warm fire, joyful music, and tinsel-covered tree? For many of us, the celebration comes at the end of weeks spent shopping, wrapping, and spending, and is wrought with family tensions, obligations, and exhaustion. Feasts & Celebrations

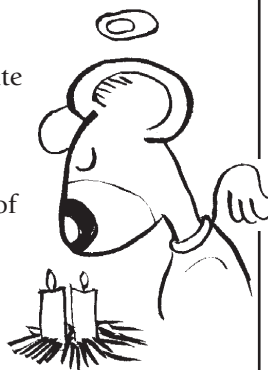
Dec. 14 – St. John of the Cross (1591). As a Carmelite, St. John led a reform in the Order to encourage more prayer and simplicity. Briefly jailed over a misunderstanding, some of his best spiritual writing came from this experience.

Dec. 21 – St. Peter Canisius (1597). Born in Holland, he was ordained into the Society of Jesus and vigorously safeguarded the Catholic faith through writings and teaching. His work, *The Catechism of the Catholic Church*, is still used today.

Dec. 26 – St. Stephen (first century).

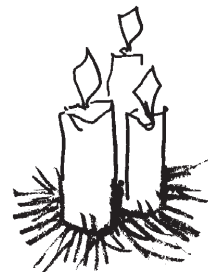
A deacon of the early Church, St. Stephen preached that God can be found everywhere, not just in one place like the temple. He angered the Jewish authorities and became the first martyr of the Catholic Church.

Dec. 29 – The Holy Family (1st century). On the feast of the Holy Family, we celebrate the family life of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. By their love and support of one another the Holy Family is a model for all Christian families.



Q & A Do I have to attend Mass on Christmas?

In our culture, Christmas has become a warm and wonderful time to gather with friends and family, a time to exchange gifts of love, and a time to enjoy family traditions. But first and foremost, Christmas celebrates the Incarnation - the



fact that the Son of God assumed a human nature in order to accomplish our salvation in it.

There is nothing the world can offer us that compares to the fact that God "so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). God came and lived among us and rose from the dead to save us. He is still with us and offers us eternal life. That's what Christmas celebrates. So, yes, we do have to go to Mass to worship, adore, and offer thanks to the one who makes our salvation possible. He was born on Christmas.

Remember, Christmas is a Holy Day of Obligation when all Catholics are obliged to attend Mass.
