From the Desk of Msgr. John DIOCESE GUIDELINES FOR GATHERING AT CHURCH AND MASSES

Parishes can return to celebrating Mass with a Congregation. We need to be careful to follow the safety guidelines proposed by our local officials. Here are some things to consider:

- + People over the age of 65 should be encouraged to continue participating from home.
- **People with a heart condition or diabetes, or have other underlying at-risk conditions, should be encouraged to continue participating from home.**
- Dispensation from Sunday obligation to attend in person is extended through May, especially with respect to people who may be considered physically well to attend, yet believe it best to stay at home.
- Parishioners should take their temperatures before coming to Mass and should not attend if exhibiting any signs of sickness.
- Those unable to attend the Mass could make an appointment with the priest to receive communion at the church office during the week or attend Mass during the week.
- **★** Concerning the celebration of Sunday Mass, consider the following:
 - Weddings and Funerals are permitted, utilizing size consideration and social distancing protocols.
 - In order to accommodate social distancing protocols, pastors are to allow in their churches no-more than 25% of the mandated fire code seating capacity of the building.
 - Those of the same household can be seated together in a pew.
 - An usher or team of ushers should be trained to make sure the church doesn't exceed attendance limitations and people follow social distancing protocols.
 - Ushers/greeters are encouraged to wear gloves and masks, and to open and close doors for parishioners upon their arrival and departure.
 - Parishioners should be careful not to gather too closely when entering or leaving the church, or stand too close in the communion line.
 - Priests, usher and parishioners should wear masks.
 - Pews should be sanitized thoroughly between Masses. Please bring wipes to clean the seats and pews in front of your row.
 - ❖ Bathrooms should be sanitized thoroughly between Masses.
 - Missalettes and hymnals should be removed from the pews and not utilized during sacramental and liturgical celebrations.
 - Liturgical ministries should be limited in number possibly celebrating Masses with one altar server and only one lector.
 - Collection should be done in such a way that no one is required to touch the basket, for example have the basket at church entrance and ask people to make contributions when entering or exiting.
 - Priests and Eucharistic Ministers should wear masks during distribution of communion.
 - The distribution of Communion is an especially sensitive time. The person receiving communion should be encouraged to receive in the hand. When communion has concluded the presiding priest should combine the consecrated hosts at the Tabernacle.
- ▶ Pastors can celebrate the Sacraments of Initiation for the Catechumens and Candidates at a time when it seems possible to do so safely and with reverence.
- **★** Bishops Cahill and Fellhauer have postponed Confirmations through May 18. We will need to consider what to do for re-scheduling.
- ★ Parish meetings and gatherings of a smaller size on parish grounds may be resumed, while utilizing established protocols for social distancing and other safety measures.



GOSPEL MEDITATION - ENCOURAGE DEEPER UNDERSTANDING OF SCRIPTURE

With whom do we converse and listen to the most? Believe it or not, the answer is ourselves. We are constantly having conversations with ourselves, and sometimes we even get caught! Our inner conversations reveal the truth about ourselves. We really cannot hide from ourselves, although we often pretend we can. By conversing with ourselves, we find solutions to our challenges, problem solve, work through our relationships, formulate opinions, run through dress rehearsals of possible conversations, and wrestle with and determine our system of priorities and values. What other voices affect the conversations we have with ourselves?

Often, voices from our past continue to haunt us. These voices cause us to mistrust our judgment, harbor anger, and cling to our fears of rejection, failure, being wrong, and the like. It is in these inner conversations that we face what holds us captive — our limitations, weaknesses, sinfulness, and stubborn ego preoccupations. We often go about our lives putting out one fire or another, keeping ourselves preoccupied and busy, and trying to stay on top of things. Intentionally or unintentionally, we find ourselves wandering off. We turn around and can no longer see our home. We look down at our feet and realize we have lost our anchor. Feeling scared, out of place, desolate, unsettled, and lonely, we realize that we are lost.

We listened to the wrong voices! In the midst of everything competing for our attention, the voice of the One who could truly call us home got muffled. We didn't hear it. As our inner dialogues continue to play out, the one voice we need to consult — even before our own — is God's. He is the Good Shepherd who can keep us safely where we need to be. As we graze through the stuff of our lives, we must constantly remember to look up, be attentive, and stay focused. Our habits of prayer are the only thing that can properly root us and keep us grounded. Contemplating God's presence and developing an inner awareness of love incarnate, we will then find ourselves praying unceasingly as the days and nights and the ebbs and flows of our lives unfold. Suddenly, the inner conversations we are constantly having are no longer just with ourselves or with voices that can lead us astray but with the Trinity, who desperately wants us to stay home. ©LPi



Why does God let us suffer?

When we watch a loved one suffer - or suffer ourselves - hearing "it's God's will," can feel unsatisfying. The implication is that God directs us like: chess pieces, and bad things result. In fact, germs, atmospheric conditions, human error, or just plain chance account for what is often outside of our control. It helps

to remember that God is always present, he wills our good, and evil is not of his doing.

God is always present.

Our Father loves us deeply, cares about our concerns right down to the haits on our heads (Matthew 10:30). He urges us to respond well to a world we can't control. If we let him, God

will enable us to learn and grow

through our experiences, no matter how overwhelming or unpleasant.

God wills our good. It is not God's will that we suffer. The ways of the world aren't always in harmony with his will. However, his plan for us will bring us the ultimate good. He loves us with true love and wants us prepped and ready for Heaven.

God doesn't make evil. What we see as evil in the world, God can use for good. When we cooperate with him,

suffering becomes meaningful, struggle worthwhile, victory affirming, and even the acceptance of what we cannot overcome life giving, as they were for Jesus.

Why Do Catholics Do That

Why do Catholics call Pentecost the "birthday of the Church?"

On the feast of Pentecost, the Apostles were in the Upper Room where they held the Passover with Jesus. All of a sudden, the Holy Spirit descended on the Apostles in the form of wind and fire. "And they were all filled with the Holy

Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance (Acts 2:4).

Then the Apostles were emboldened and rushed out to: preach the Gospel and baptized 3,000 people. We call this the "birthday" of the Church because this is the day when the Holy Spint made the Church visible to the world.

Jesus understands

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who has similarly been tested in every way, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15). It is assounding to think that in his human nature, Jesus experienced fear and suffering, just like we do. Even better, he wants to help.

Fear. Early in his life, soldiers hunted him down to kill him. His neighbors threatened him with harm when they didn't like his teaching. He endured a horrific Passion. Jesus coped by relying on prayer, grace, and confidence in his Father's will. He showed us how so we can endure, as well. Suffering, During his carcifixion, Jesus became

Suffering. During his crucifixion, lesus became sick, dehydrated, and exhausted as his body began to shut down. Once on the Cross, it became harder and harder for him to

breathe. In fact, throughout his life, Jesus experienced how it feels for a body to fail. He knows how it feels to die. When we are sick and suffering, we can turn to him for a cure or the grace and strength to accept his will. All we have to do is ask.



John 20:19-23, Jesus gives us the Holy Spirit

This Gospel shows us a glimpse of how most of the disciples spent their first Easter Sunday - hiding in fear.

They were terrified the Romans would find them and execute them. What if the Resurrection really happened as Mary Magdalene said? What if Jesus came looking for them? Would he punish them for abandoning him when they should have stayed?

Yet, Jesus appeared to them within the locked room and spoke words of peace. He wasn't a ghost; his glorified body wasn't limited by the physical world. He showed them his wounds as "the living proof" of the Resurrection. Imagine the Apostles' great relief at having their Friend back. Jesus did come looking for them, not in anger,

but offering his forgiveness.
Instead of punishing
them, lesus gave them a
mission and the Holy
Spirit to help them.
He said, "Whose sins
you forgive are forgiven
them, and whose sins you
retain are retained" (John

20:23), establishing the Sacrament of Penance. Having authority to forgive sins, the Apostles and their successors could continue Jesus' work after he returned to Heaven.



May 12 – Sts. Nereus and Achilleus (1st century). Not much is known about them, but it is certain they were Roman soldiers under the Emperor Trajan, They converted to Christianity, were exiled from Rome, and eventually martyred.

May 14 – St. Matthias the Apostle (1st century). Chosen by lot to replace Judas Iscariot, St. Matthias is only mentioned once in Scripture, but had accompanied Jesus and the Twelve from the beginning. He spent his life preaching the Good News until his martyrdom. May 18 - Pope St. John I (526). Born in Tuscany, Italy, John was elected pope in 523 while a deacon. His visit to Constantinople restored peace with the Eastern Church yet raised political suspicions. Arrested by King Theodoric, he died in prison.

May 21 - Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord (1st century). This solemnity marks the completion of lesus' mission of salvation and his triumphant entry into Heaven. Note: In many dioceses, observance of Ascension has been moved to the following.

Why is Mary pictured with a blue mantle?

In the Old
Testament, the Ark
of the Covenant was
covered in blue (or
"violet") fabric for
traveling (Numbers
4:5-6). God's Presence
would "rest" on the Ark
as a king sits on his throne
(Exodus 25:22).

When Mary agreed to be the Mother of Jesus (i.e. God), she became his living "resting place," In art, Mary's blue mantle signals she is the new Ark of the Covenant.

Blue also indicates Mary's royal status. Jesus is the King of Heaven making Mary the Queen Mother. In Biblical times, the mother (not the wife) of the long was the queen. She wasn't as powerful as the king, but her intercession with him had significant influence.

Mary is not God, but her intercessory prayers for us are powerful because she is lesus' mother. When we consider that Mary is also our mother by grace, her blue mantle invites us to entrust our concerns to her. Rather than an obstacle to Jesus, Mary leads us directly to him by a sure, safe path.
